A Vision For the Future of the Mitchell Park Domes

The Mitchell Park Domes was never just a building. It was an expression of an idea: hope lives. Consider the context in which the domes were constructed ... middle of the century in the post-war era. Like the rest of the world, Milwaukee was overcoming the ravages of war.

Built in what was, at the time, an industrial valley, these glorious glass bubbles rose from a field of smokestacks. Because of their unique and daringly beautiful shape, they were described as a "willful act of hope."

A Big Problem

We are all familiar with the many challenges facing The Domes. The chipping concrete; the failing glass and aluminum; an original-to-the-build HVAC system; the lack of compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act; the large carbon footprint.

All that, and we haven't discussed sustainability. The Domes has been operating at a deficit for decades—requiring the County to cover shortfalls.

There have been 25 years of studies and plans with no consensus and no path forward. It is safe to say that The Domes has what only can be described as a Big Hairy Audacious Problem.

With that said, this isn't a doomsday article. On the contrary, we are here to talk about a potential bright future for our beloved conservatory.

A Bright Idea

As you may know, Friends of the Domes is a private nonprofit that conducts about half of the operations at The Domes: membership, retail sales, education programming, marketing, and much more.

What you may have noticed of late is that we are an organization on the move. We more than doubled our membership, school field trip participants, fundraising revenue, and Domes admissions over the past two years. We accomplished this through strategic investments in infrastructure and staff resources. Today, we have 22 staff, hundreds of volunteers, and nearly 5,000 members.

Based on this success (that you helped make happen!), the Friends of the Domes Board of Directors adopted a new strategy for the Mitchell Park Domes.

This vision:

- Addresses the building's physical challenges.
- Revitalizes Mitchell Park.
- Enables The Domes to generate sufficient operating income.

The plan includes restoring the domes (new glazing and aluminum), a new café, increased educational facilities, an expanded gift shop, enhanced events space—and, importantly, long overdue steps to reinvigorate

Mitchell Park itself. In addition, the energy inefficiencies will be managed through a series of strategic investments.

This exciting vision also comes with a funding solution ... necessary funds would come from private philanthropy, municipal and other public funding sources, and, *hopefully*, an investment from Milwaukee County. Friends of the Domes would take the lead on both the private philanthropic campaign and securing the municipal and other public funding.

A key element of the plan is that it would result in an enhanced partnership between Friends of the Domes and Milwaukee County Parks (similar to other cultural institutions such as the Milwaukee County Zoo). This is a critical step in ensuring a sustainable business model that generates more revenue than expenses.

Although we still have a lot of work ahead of us, the initial response to this plan has been tremendously positive. The needed funds are available if all the stakeholders that hold the key pieces of the puzzle agree to join forces.

We will keep you informed as we take more steps toward achieving this vision. Thank you for everything you have done (and will do) to ensure a path forward!

FOR THE LOVE OF NATURE

Craft Chocolate From Bean to Bar: Interview with Dan Bieser from Tabal Chocolate

Between holiday indulgences and brisk hot cocoa weather, winter is the perfect time to celebrate chocolate. The bean of the Theobroma cacao tree is the most important ingredient in chocolate. A beautiful Theobroma cacao tree lives in our very own Tropical Dome. To learn more about our Theobroma and how its fruit becomes chocolate, we interviewed local artisan chocolate maker Dan Bieser from Tabal Chocolate.

1. How did you get your start?

In the Spring of 2012, I started my chocolate journey with a spring break trip to Toronto where I was exposed to the craft

of bean to bar chocolate making. The wonderful people at ChocoSol Chocolate invited me to learn about chocolate making and horizontal trading of cacao beans. I returned home with some basic knowledge, a few tools, and some Mexican cacao beans. I started making chocolate in the back room of our home and was quickly invited to move operations to the garage. In the Summer of 2012, I found a commercial space at Amaranth Cafe to begin our chocolate making as a business.

2. What can you tell us about the Theobroma cacao tree?

The Theobroma cacao tree is the only tree that produces the

beans used for traditional chocolate. Craft chocolate makers prefer fine flavor cacao grown in Central and South America. The cacao tree take 3-5 years to grow from seedling to a fruiting tree. Cacao trees can live in excess of 100 years but their productivity diminishes over time. Beans are harvested in the spring and fall.

3. How do you choose who and where to get your cocoa beans from?

When I travel to Peru, Colombia, Costa Rica, and Nicaragua I meet farmers that are growing some amazingly flavorful

cacao. The challenge is building a relationship with those farmers, getting samples to test, and ultimately figuring out the logistics of getting the cacao to Tabal Chocolate. We source cacao from the best producers in the world through word-ofmouth and sometimes they also contact Tabal on their own.

4. Other than cocoa bean trees, are there other ingredients that you select or research as carefully as you do your cocoa?

As Craft Chocolate Makers, we make the chocolate from the cacao bean. We also use nutrient-dense and exotic, flavorful ingredients like organic teas, whole vanilla beans, macambo (a close relative of Theobroma cacao), sacha inchi, lacuma (a Peruvian fruit), and many other superfoods. We research carefully and source these specialty ingredients from small scale farmers.



5. What's the best part about owning Tabal Chocolate and making craft chocolate?

The best part of making chocolate at Tabal is the opportunity to be creative in developing craft chocolate as a food. Single origin cacao offers a lifetime of variations and possibilities in chocolate making. We love to share our passion through

teaching and relationship building. The sweet chocolate smell of a hard days work lingers long after we arrive home.

Visit The Domes to see a Theobroma cacao tree, to enjoy the tropical climate they prefer, and to purchase Tabal chocolate from our gift shop.

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Meet Parks Exhibit Designer and Show Dome Artist: Mel Lancy

am the exhibit designer for Milwaukee County Parks. In this role, I develop the themes for the floral shows at The Domes and artistically support other Parks locations as needed. I am the only exhibit designer on the Parks' staff.

My role has a direct influence on the artistic vision for the floral exhibits. I enjoy working in this fast-paced environment with forward-thinking individuals while maintaining the autonomy to develop artwork for each show. With each production, we aim to create an immersive environment that reflects a symbiotic union between plant life, art and the viewer.

My passion lies in transforming two-dimensional designs into actual three-dimensional creations. I received a Bachelor of Fine Arts from the Rhode Island School of Design where I studied illustration and architecture. Upon graduation, I explored the commercial scenic industry creating sculptures and scenery for zoos, theme parks, museums, and other locations.

I also worked as a production designer for various theaters, colleges, and high schools throughout the Chicago area. I developed my talents there, but I knew I wanted to live in a community more tied to nature. Wisconsin feels like a place that intertwines the importance of experiencing nature and celebrating the changing seasons.

In 2015, we moved to Milwaukee. After my daughter was born, we would take daily adventures to parks and festivals in the area. We have been to more than 75 different Milwaukee County Parks. The Domes became one of our favorites and was even the location of the photo for our first family Christmas card after she was born. Little did I know that one day I would be the artist working on the shows!

When I plan shows, I work closely with the Horticultural Services Director for The Domes, Doris Maki, and the lead horticulturist of the Show Dome, Emily Lambercht. We enjoy exploring creative, new ways to engage the space and the public.

Emily and I work in tandem to

present, research, and develop theme ideas for each show years in advance of the show opening. I focus on the overall vision for the show and the visitor experience. I source or create any props needed to define the space and present the theme. Emily and I plan how best to arrange the plants and props to form a symbiotic connection between the two. It is that magical merger that really helps transform each show into its own unique experience.

Designing for The Domes allows me to create immersive environments; use art and plants to tell interesting and educational stories; and inspire the protection of our natural world. ■

Bader Philanthropies Grant Supports Older Adult Programming: Growing And Thriving

PARK! at The Domes and the Growing and Thriving Workshop are two exciting programs that have been helping older adults connect with others and nature, thanks to a grant from Bader Philanthropies. This is the second of a two-part article that highlights these special opportunities.

In this issue, we highlight the Growing and Thriving Workshop.

Being at The Domes surrounded by plants makes us feel better. In fact, according to public health researchers, connecting to nature is not just a fun pastime, it is critical to our emotional and physical well-being. It reduces feelings of anger, fear and stress. It also contributes to physical health, reducing blood pressure and stress-related illnesses.

The Friends of the Domes Growing and Thriving Workshop is a free program that helps older adults receive these health benefits. Offered four times per year (once in Spanish), participants receive a brief history of The Domes, information about the

benefits of caring for a plant, and a tour of the Tropical Dome. They also get a basic lesson in houseplant husbandry. Attendees also are able to select a tropical plant to repot and take home with them. The plants are placed in a beautiful, handmade pot (thanks to a partnership with La Familia de Arte).

One past participant had this to say about the program: "Just wanted to tell you how much I enjoyed your class yesterday.
Continuing to learn new things is a goal of mine, and I learned two new things! Also, every time I look at my new plant, I smile.

Thank you for making my day."
